²⁹ When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, ³⁰ saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. ³¹ If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.'"

- **TODAY, April 10**, in commemoration of Palm Sunday, Dr. Herman Weiss and the First Parish Choir will present *“Once Upon a Tree”*, a cantata with words and music by Pepper Choplin, as the centerpiece of our 10 AM Worship time. This deeply spiritual experience is not to be missed!

The cantata tells the story of Jesus’s final entrance into Jerusalem and portrays the Passion story through His crucifixion to the light of His resurrection.
