The Service of Tenebrae

The Service of Tenebrae (Shadows) is an adaptation of an early fourth century liturgy. This evening, the rule of silence is observed -no conversation or greetings other than the silent recognition of friends. The Tenebrae service consists of scripture read without comment. The readings commemorate the Passion of Jesus Christ - the Last Supper, the betrayal, the arrest; his trial, crucifixion, and death. The gradual dimming of the lights is symbolic of the shadow of the cross. At the conclusion of the service, remain to meditate as long as you wish, then leave in silence.

The Shadow of Betrayal, Matthew 26:20-25 Nancy Peterson

When it was evening, he took his place with the twelve; and while they were eating, he said, "Truly I tell you, one of you will betray me." And they became greatly distressed and began to say to him one after another, "Surely not I, Lord." He answered, "The one who has dipped his hand into the bowl with me will betray me. The Son of Man goes as it is written of him, but woe to the one by whom the Son of Man is betrayed!

It would have been better for that one not to have been born." Judas, who betrayed him said, "Surely not I Rabbi?" Jesus replied, "You have said so."

Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane; and he said to his disciples, "Sit here while I go over there and pray." He took with him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, and began to be sorrowful and troubled. Then he said to them, "My soul is very sorrowful, even to death; remain here, and stay awake with me." And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed, "My Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as you will it." Then he came to the disciples and found them sleeping and he said to Peter, "So could you not watch with me one hour?"

Immediately, while he was still speaking, Judas, one of the twelve, arrived; and with him there was a crowd with swords and clubs from the chief priests, the scribes, and the elders. Now the betrayer had given them a sign, saying, "The one I will kiss is the man; arrest him and lead him away under guard." So when he came, he went up to him at once and said, "Rabbi!" and kissed him. Then they laid hands on him and arrested him. ... Then Jesus said to them, "Have you come out with swords and clubs to arrest me as though I were a bandit? Day after day I was with you in the temple teaching, and you did not arrest me. But let the scriptures be fulfilled." All of them deserted him and fled.

When morning came, all the chief priests and the elders of the people conferred together against Jesus in order to bring about his death. They bound him, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate the governor.

Now Jesus stood before the governor; and the governor asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus said, "You have said so." But when he was accused by the chief priests and elders, he did not answer. Then Pilate said to him, "Do you not hear how many accusations they make against you?" But he gave them no answer, not even to a single charge, so that the governor was greatly amazed.

Now Peter was below in the courtyard, one of the servant-girls of the high priest came by. When she saw Peter warming himself, she stared at him and said, "You also were with Jesus, the man from Nazareth." But he denied it, saying, "I do not know or understand what you are talking about." ... Then the cock crowed. And the servant-girl, on seeing him, began again to say to the bystanders, "This man is one of them!" But again he denied it.

Then after a little while, the bystanders again said to Peter, "Certainly you are one of them; for you are a Galilean." But he began to curse, and he swore an oath, "I do not know this man you are talking about." At that moment the cock crowed for the second time. Then Peter remembered that Jesus had said to him, "Before the cock crows twice, you will deny me three times." And he broke down and wept.

The Shadow of Violence, Mark 15:16-20 Jan Marshall

Then the soldiers led Jesus into the courtyard of the palace ... and they called together the whole battalion. And they clothed him in a purple cloak; and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on him. And they began saluting him, "Hail, King of the Jews!" They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him, and knelt down in homage to him. After mocking him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him.

The Shadow of Golgotha, Matthew 27:32-33 & Mark 15:25-26 John Round

And when they came to a place called Golgotha, (which means Place of a Skull), they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it.

It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews."

Two others also who were criminals were led away to be put to death with Jesus ... one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."

And the soldiers cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him saying, "He saved others, let him save himself if he is the Messiah - God's Chosen One!"

The Shadow of Death, Mark 15: 33-34 & 37-39 Joe Alsop

When it was noon, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Then Jesus uttered a loud cry, and breathed his last.

And the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. And when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that he thus breathed his last, he said, "Truly this man was the Son of God!"
