Stephen Ministry

The Stephen Ministry at First Parish is Underway: next meeting May 22

We are pleased to announce that Stephen Ministry held its first general, in person meeting on Monday April 17. Our near term goals are threefold: 1. To support and augment the ongoing work of the Care Team in any way we can; 2. Develop an informal Stephen Ministry of confidential one on one support within the Congregation (as distinguished from the more "public" work of the Care Team) and 3. Develop our Community Resource Network of local agencies which can provide specialized tangible support to care receivers such as temporary housing, medical assistance, or similar services. Our longer term (2-4 year) goal is to train interested members of the Congregation to be Stephen Ministers to the broader community outside the church. In this endeavor we are in close touch with the Stephen Ministry programs in other area churches and expect to benefit from their experience, advice, and support.

Our next general meeting will be on Monday, May 22, at 7 pm in the Conference Room. We intend to be in HYBRID mode, but we hope many folks will come in person and enjoy the fellowship and refreshments. Please be assured that there is NO OBLIGATION to do anything in particular if you come to the meeting. We are in the very early stages of a multi-year program, so it is perfectly fine to just come and find out what this is all about. If you feel called to undertake one of the various service opportunities, just participate at the time that is right for you.

As we hope the congregation is aware, the Stephen Ministry—named for Stephen, who in Acts 6 was appointed to assist members of the community suffering acute hardships—is a 50-year-old interdenominational Christian tradition. The service trains lay members of the congregation in psychology and theology to be a Christian presence with any in the community suffering acute challenges. Typical examples would include bereavement, divorce, terminal illness, substance abuse, or mental illness. Fully details of the program are here: Ministries Stephen Minister's objective is not to "solve" the challenge but rather to ensure that none feel alone in their struggles. (Jesus, after all, did not come to "fix" all of our challenges, but rather to be with us in our struggles.) At the same time, the Stephen Ministry in a congregation develops a network of specialized services suitable to assist individuals with specific problems.

The team is currently working closely with the Outreach & Service Committee and the Care Team on this project. Outreach and Service has made a generous financial contribution to cover startup costs. Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing as an average woman. But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute takes a very unscientific view of equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans; the lonely, brilliant, Nobel-prize nominated grudge-holder who falls in love with—of all things—her mind. True chemistry results. But like science, life is unpredictable. Which is why a few years later Elizabeth Zott finds herself not only a single mother, but the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show Supper at Six. Elizabeth's unusual approach to cooking ("combine one tablespoon acetic acid with a pinch of sodium chloride") proves revolutionary. But as her following grows, not everyone is happy. Because as it turns out, Elizabeth Zott isn't just teaching women to cook. She's daring them to change the status quo. Laugh-out-loud funny, shrewdly observant, and studded with a dazzling cast of supporting characters, Lessons in Chemistry is as original and vibrant as its protagonist. goodreads

A discarded painting in a junk pile, a skeleton in an attic, and the greatest racehorse in American history: from these strands, a Pulitzer Prize winner braids a sweeping story of spirit, obsession, and injustice across American history. Kentucky, 1850. An enslaved groom named Jarret and a bay foal forge a bond of understanding that will carry the horse to record-setting victories across the South. When the nation erupts in civil war, an itinerant young artist who has made his name on paintings of the racehorse takes up arms for the Union. On a perilous night, he reunites with the stallion and his groom, very far from the glamor of any racetrack. New York City, 1954, Martha Jackson, a gallery owner celebrated for taking risks on edgy contemporary painters, becomes obsessed with a nineteenth-century equestrian oil painting of mysterious provenance. Washington, DC, 2019. Jess, a Smithsonian scientist from Australia, and Theo, a Nigerian-American art historian, find themselves unexpectedly connected through their shared interest in the horse. One studying the stallion's bones for clues to his power and endurance, the other uncovering the lost history of the unsung Black horsemen who were critical to his racing success. Based on the remarkable true story of the record-breaking thoroughbred Lexington, Horse is a novel of art and science, love and obsession, and our unfinished reckoning with racism. goodreads

We continue to pray for Reverend Herber's good health and all others that are facing challenges. As always, please contact a Deacon for any needs or suggestions. We are here for you.


